Analyzing an Argument Step #1: Determine the author's argument 1 To find the argument, first look at the TITLE of the text Titles usually indicate the writer's purpose/position Some argument writers may state the argument in the title and NOT state it anywhere else 2 If you can't find it in the TITLE, look in the INTRODUCTION
