The Huichol are a deeply spiritual people whose beliefs include wolves that speak to them, rain-bearing snakes, and jaguars that bring messages from God One fourth of the men are shaman, or healers, who use hallucinogenic peyote to bring enlightenment and visions of color or shape to transfer to their beaded bowls or yarn drawings

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
